SUNNYSIDE ADOPTS MASSANETTA SPRINGS ROAD

At least twice a year, volunteers from Sunnyside will pick up the roadside trash from Rt 33 to Shen Lake Drive. VDOT will provide safety signs, safety vests, gloves and orange trash bags. Once each date is selected by the Green Committee, up to four volunteers will be recruited for each pick up, who will be trained in safety procedures and what to pick up and what to leave. Physical ability to walk uneven ground, to stoop, and to handle a large plastic bag for approximately two hours is required. 3. **UPS** service here on campus: shipping dept.

4. Kroger's: **Private Selection** items: jams/jellies, sorbet, bread (extremely thin rye).

5. Marvelous **a capella congregational singing**: Park View Mennonite Church, near EMU: 9:30 am, Sundays; also WEMC

6. **24-hr classical music** (except 9:30-10:30 Sunday and 8-9 pm Wednesday) : **WEMC 91.7** *Sing for Joy* from St. Olaf on Sundays at 7 am

7. Karis Consignment Store: south of Bridgewater on Rt. 11, furniture and household items

8. **WONDERFUL THRIFT STORES: Tried and True**, near Costco and Sunnyside Corporate Office and **Gift and Thrift**: Mt. Clinton Pike, near EMU

9. Sharp Shopper: Rt. 11 south

The Carniglia's home here at Sunnyside served as our “restaurant” for the evening and it is a lovely and serene setting, elegantly Asian décor with Japanese artwork and hostess dressed in traditional

kimono. Our menu was based on the sophisticated traditional Japanese multi-course meal (Kaiseki) prepared from fresh, seasonal ingredients. It is a wonderfully delicate form of Japanese cuisine not commonly found outside of its native home. Each course is small and aesthetically pleasing, a work of art on your



plate. Our hostess explained each course, the preparation, why certain items are prepared in a special way and their significance. It was an amazing cultural experience along with a delicious meal. Starting with Mukouzuke (appetizers) through 7 courses we sampled everything from sashimi – a dish most of us had never tried before – oysters, shrimp, spring roll, chicken, a clear soup, and finally, our dessert a beautiful rose-colored poached pear. The entire meal was a feast for eyes and stomachs. I don't have nearly the space to describe each course to you, so ask one of us about the experience; we will be happy to tell you all about it.

APPLE HARVEST CHILI

1 16 oz. jar thick and chunky salsa
1 15-16 oz. can chick peas, rinsed and drained
1 15-16 oz. can black beans, rinsed and drained
1 14.5 oz. can reduced-sodium chicken broth
1 apple, chopped
2/3 c. dried cranberries, golden raisins, or snipped
dried apricots
1 T unsweetened cocoa powder
2-3 t. chili powder
Several dashes chipotle-flavor bottled hot pepper
sauce
2/3 c. coarsely chopped cashews

In a 4- or 5-quart Dutch oven,* combine all ingredients except cashews. Bring to boiling; reduce heat; simmer, covered, for 20 minutes. Just before serving, stir in cashews. (I add the cashews separately to each serving.) Makes 4-5 servings.
